## Reunion Survey Results

### Not Enough Reunion Support

In the Winter 2015 edition of *The Hourglass*, on page 29, the membership was solicited for input regarding their support of future reunions, and their preferred locations. The following is the result of the input received.

The paid membership reported in the last *The Hourglass* was 304 and, thanks to a lot of the formerly dues exempt "Honored" members paying their dues after the change in the by-laws was announced, our paid membership is up to 483 as of 31 Jan 16. We actually lost 266 members who had been paid through June 30, 2015 but failed to renew their membership.

Of the 483 members currently in good standing, we received survey responses (see chart below) from only 15 members - **a meager 3.1%!** There were 25 locations suggested, and the location with the largest number of first place votes was Tacoma (6 members). The other locations with the largest number of votes overall (first, second or third place) were Branson, MO and Columbus, GA.

This information has been reviewed by the officers and Governors and they have come to the following conclusion: **there is insufficient support for a reunion at this time.**

The Officers & Governors have instructed the Editor of *The Hourglass* to include in each future edition of the newsletter a request for members to submit their preferences for reunion sites and their commitment to attend if that site is chosen. When the membership support is sufficient, a reunion will be planned.

There were only 15 members who sent in their preferences for the location of future reunions, and the choices were:

**It's official; DD-214s are NOW Online**

It's official; DD-214s are NOW Online. Please pass on to other vets. The National Personnel Records Center (NPRC) has provided the following website for veterans to gain access to their DD-214s online:

<http://www.archives.gov/veterans/military-service-records/>

This may be particularly helpful when a veteran needs a copy of his DD-214 for employment purposes. NPRC is working to make it easier for veterans with computers and Internet access to obtain copies of documents from their military files.

Military veterans and the next of kin of deceased former military members may now use a new online military personnel records system to request documents. Other individuals with a need for documents must still complete the Standard Form 180, which can be downloaded from the online web site.

Because the requester will be asked to supply all information essential for NPRC to process the request, delays that normally occur when NPRC has to ask veterans for additional information will be minimized. The new web-based application was designed to provide better service on these requests by eliminating the records centers mailroom and processing time. Please pass this information on to former military personnel you may know and their dependents. It's official; DD-214s are NOW Online. Please pass on to other vets. # Big Change to Army Dog Tags

**M**ilitary ID tags — commonly known as dog tags — have been part of military service since World War I. Unfortunately, quite a bit of personal information is contained on the metal tags, which raises the potential risk of identity theft.

In 2007, DoD announced an initiative designed to better protect servicemembers by replacing Social Security numbers with randomly generated 10-digit military ID numbers on dog tags and other military-issued documents, reports Michael Klemowski, Soldiers Programs branch chief, U.S. Army Human Resources Command, Fort Knox, Ky.

The first military ID tags contained only a servicemember's name; additional information, such as religious affiliation, was included later, notes Klemowski. The last time a major change was made to dog tags was 1972, when service numbers were replaced by Social Security numbers.

Military personnel knew the importance of identification as far back as the Civil War. Soldiers of that era often placed scraps of paper containing their names and names of family members and

their hometowns in their pockets or on their clothing with pins so their remains could be returned home should they perish on the battlefield.

However, current military ID tags place servicemembers at high risk, notes Klemowski, because they contain everything necessary for identity theft except a servicemember's date of birth. Transitioning to military ID numbers adds an important layer of protection.

Though the initiative was announced in 2007, the Army had to wait for technology to catch up before it could start issuing the new tags. "The problem was getting the systems and machines to understand a 10-digit ID number versus a nine-digit Social Security number," Klemowski explains.

Army recruits and soldiers set to deploy will be the first to receive the new dog tags. The latter will receive new tags through their soldier readiness processing center. "This change is not something where soldiers need to run out and get new tags made," says Klemowski. "It's on an as-needed basis." Other branches soon will follow.

**Why I chose the military service for my life long career:** I was about 11 years old when I first saw the 1941 movie: "They Died with Their Boots On", starring Errol Flynn, who played Major General George Armstrong Custer, and Olivia de Havilland. Even though the movie was a highly fictionalized version of George A. Custer's life, it was an inspiration for me and Custer became my role model.

I was born in Aiea, Oahu, Hawaii, what was then the Territory of Hawaii, on December 2, 1932. The town of Aiea in Hawaii of the 30's and 40's was a sleepy sugar plantation town punctuated by a sugar mill and several ethnic camps of various racial groups employed by the Sugar Planters Association. Aiea is situated less than a mile from the U. S. Naval Base of Pearl Harbor. On December 7<sup>th</sup>, 1941, I was a 9 years old eye witness to the attack on the United States Navy's 7<sup>th</sup> Fleet at Pearl Harbor. I witnessed the attack from my best friend's home which was situated on the way to Aiea Heights and the Oahu Sugar Mill. Aiea Heights provided a birds-eye view of Battleship Row and the entire attack on Pearl Harbor by the Japanese. The mill was later procured by the California and Hawaiian Sugar Corporation in California and used to process brown sugar molasses into white, refined sugar. The attack came in two phases. The initial attack occurred around 7:55 a.m. when Japanese Zeroes used a low level methodology to allow maximum hits by their modified torpedoes. The second attack occurred an hour later with high level bombing runs.

At the time of the initial attack, everyone I knew, including my family, thought that the Navy was conducting yet another war game maneuver. As we listened to the radio broadcasts from radio station KGU and the CBS network station, KGMB radio, we quickly learned that the planes flying around Pearl Harbor were not American, and that a large red circle could be seen on the wings of the aircraft. At that time, reports were confusing and sketchy as pandemonium broke out all over the island, especially around the military bases of Pearl Harbor, Hickam Field, Fort Shafter, and Schofield Barracks, including Wheeler Field in central Oahu. Coinciding with the attack by the Japanese was the expected arrival of a fleet of American B-17 bombers. About a half hour into the initial attack, I saw one B-17 flying low above the sugar mill in Aiea. The radio stations picked up momentum as reports began pouring in. They warned all citizens to stay home away from Pearl Harbor, Aiea, and Waipahu areas. I decided to return home from my friend's house. My mother, sister, brother, and a family friend took us to Aiea Heights near the Keaiwa Heiau (ancient Hawaiian temple) which was at the end of the road.

It was dangerous to be outside and moving around during that time, as the tall Japanese pine trees at the heiau would have their tops sheared off by the Navy machine gun fire at Pearl Harbor as sailors and ship crews fired back at the Japanese with their .50 caliber machine guns. We remained at Aiea Heights until around 4 p.m., when everything went quiet and we were able to return home. Both bombings and gun fire stopped completely; however, as it became dark, there was a lot of gun fire as I believe people were shooting at our own planes taking off from an aircraft carrier returning to Pearl Harbor.

After that traumatic day, the territory was placed under Marshall Law and a military government was put in place. Military patrolled our plantation camp, known as "Filipino Camp." We had a "no light" after dark and a curfew. Our window panes had to be painted in opaque black. All residents in Hawaii were provided with a gas mask. My sister was provisioned with a bunny mask as she was only 2 years old at the time. In the event of a gas attack, she was to be placed into a bag with a hand pump which someone had to use to pump air into the bag.

Most of the schools in existence at the time were provided with concrete bomb shelters. In 1942, when we pledged allegiance to the flag of the United States, we used the German Salute, with our palms up and arms at a 45 degree angle. This was later changed to hand over our hearts as we do today. (See next page)

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 Age 18 – United States Army



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On December 15, 1947, a few weeks after my 15<sup>th</sup> birthday, I enlisted into the 298<sup>th</sup> Infantry of the Hawaii National Guard. I was in my glory and had perfect attendance records on weekend drills and the two summer camps held in 1948 and 1949. One of the requirements of the Guard was to inform the Selective Service to exempt me from the draft. I was informed by my home town local Selective Service Board, that, according to their records I was 18 years old and have not registered for the draft. I informed them that I was not 18 years old in 1947 and provided proof of my birth certificate. I was excused and two weeks later, I had to report to the Regimental Commander of the 298<sup>th</sup> Infantry. He informed me that I had committed fraud and that I would be discharged from the National Guard for fraudulent enlistment. About three weeks later, I went to the Territorial Governor's Office in the Lolani Palace in Honolulu. I had a pre-written letter prepared for the Governor, who was not in at the time, so I presented it to the clerk. Two weeks later I was informed that my letter was accepted and I can report to the Personnel Office at Fort Ruger, where they would take care of my Honorable Discharge.

On July 25<sup>th</sup>, 1950 with the Korean War ramping up, I talked to the Naval Recruiter about enlisting in the Navy. At that time in Hawaii, the U. S. Navy did not accept enlistees into the Navy. I would have had to go to California to enlist; however, the Naval Reserve was accepting enlistees. They informed me that I could request active duty within three months. After three months I requested active duty and was informed that I had to wait until I was promoted to Seaman Apprentice. In November 1950, I was promoted to Seaman Apprentice, yet was informed that I still could not apply for active duty.

In December 1950, I went to the Army Recruiting Office and enlisted in the Army. On December 15, 1950, I was sworn in and sent to Schofield Barracks, Hawaii, with assignment to the Far East Unassigned. I trained for 14 months in the infantry field. In March 1951, after completion of basic training, we were sent to Camp Drake, Japan where we drew our combat equipment, including winter gear. After 4 days, we were transported by rail to Sasebo, Japan and loaded into a Japanese freighter. We slept on tatami mats on our way to Pusan, Korea. We arrived in Pusan the next morning and were loaded onto a troop train bound for Taegu, where the 7<sup>th</sup> Infantry Replacement Depot was situated. The replacement depot was looking for a bull dozer operator, or a person that knew how to operate a bull dozer. My father taught me how to operate one, so I volunteered. I was assigned to the 13<sup>th</sup> Engineer Battalion, 7<sup>th</sup> Infantry Division. When I got into the company, I was told that they did not need a bull dozer operator, and the only earth moves that I will see is a "D-handle shovel, hand operated, air cooled with as many strokes I could produce in a minute." I was to train as a demolition man. Because of my National Guard service, I was promoted to Private E-2. Three months later I was promoted to Private First Class, E-3, and in two more months I was promoted to Corporal E-4. Still two more months later, I was promoted to Sergeant E-5. After serving one full year I was rotated back to the States and assigned to Fort Huachuca, Arizona. I was assigned to the 820<sup>th</sup> Aviation Engineer Battalion, SCA-RWAF (Special Category Army Assigned to Air Force). We were assigned to the Air Force for pay and equipment. Our unit's home base was Beale Air Force Base, in Marysville, California. The 820<sup>th</sup> was sent to Edwards Air Force Base, California to mark the dry lake bed for B-36 overruns and all emergency landings for the test planes used. (Edwards AFB was the same base where the space shuttle landed).

In December 1953, I was discharged and re-enlisted at Camp Stoneman, California to be assigned to the 1<sup>st</sup> Battalion, 7<sup>th</sup> Cavalry Regiment, 1<sup>st</sup> Cavalry Division at Chitose, Hokkaido, Japan. We moved to Camp Haugen, Japan later and then on my final tour, three years later, to Camp Otsu, next to Lake Biwako, Japan.

I served with the 1<sup>st</sup> Infantry Division, Fort Riley, Kansas and with the 1<sup>st</sup> Brigade, 35<sup>th</sup> Infantry, with subsequent assignments to the 25<sup>th</sup> Engineer Battalion. I spent two different tours in Hawaii, both with the 25<sup>th</sup> Infantry Division. I also served with the 7<sup>th</sup> Infantry Division from 1951-1952, 1962-1963, and 1969-1970, respectively. (See next page)

In 1964, while with the 25<sup>th</sup> Infantry Division, 65<sup>th</sup> Engineer Battalion, I was under classified orders for Aerial Gunnery Training, initially with the H21 helicopter and at the last minute on the UH-1B helicopter (Huey). In March 1953, we were loaded on an Air Force Globemaster plane for a flight to Wake Island, Anderson Field, Guam, Clark Airfield, Philippines, and finally to Tan Son Nhut, South Vietnam. We were assigned on Temporary Duty (TDY) with the 121<sup>st</sup> Assault Helicopter Company, Soc Trang, Vietnam. There were three squads of trained machine gunners to be assigned to 2 slick helicopters. I was assigned to the Army helicopter squad. Each squad was assigned to 8 helicopters each or a total of 16 slick ships and 8 armed helicopter gunships. The slick ships carried supplies and troops to the assault landing zones where the armed ships provided suppressing fire or engaged the Viet Cong with 6 machine guns and 2.75 inch rocket fire. Upon completion of that assignment I was awarded 4 Air Medals for 180 assault missions.

My final assignment was at Fort Leonard Wood, Missouri, to a Basic Training Battalion. I worked as an Operations Sergeant in the S-3 (Training/Operations) shop. I was to be promoted to Master Sergeant (E-8) but refused the promotion because I was three months to my retirement. I retired from active service on March 1, 1971.

Bill; I received the newsletter you sent. Thanks a lot.

The following is a synopsis of the units I served in during my career: Basic Training---Ft Dix, NJ, Jan 16 1959-Mar '59; AIT--Ft Leonard Wood, Mo., Apr-Jun '59; Co D, 78th Engr Bn, Karlsruhe, Germany (Phillips Barracks), Jul '59-Jul '61;

Co B, 20 Engr Bn, Ft Devens, MA, Sep '61-Mar '62....While assigned to the 20th, I participated in "Exercise Big Bear" in Alaska. We built an ice bridge across the Tanacross (Sp ?) River. Then it was on to Co E, 2nd Engr Bn, 2nd Inf Div Ft Benning, GA from Apr '62 - Jan, '64. We were on constant alert during the Cuban Missile Crisis. Co A 13th Engr Bn, 7th Inf Div, Korea (I believe the name of the local village was Unchon Ni (Sp ?) from Feb '64 - Feb '65. We were initially based at Camp Schoonover then moved to Camp Kaiser. I left there in Feb '65 for another tour in Germany with the 78th Engr Bn--this time it was Co C stationed in Ettlingen from Apr '65 until Apr '66 at which time, I volunteered for Viet Nam.

I graduated from 7th Army NCO Academy. My next assignment was to Co B 1st Engr Bn, 1st Inf Div from May '66 to May '67. We were headquartered in Dian, RVN. I was promoted to SSG E-6. I made a lot of good friends while there.

I received orders for Germany (again) but I managed to get out of going back. I wound up going to Drill Sergeant School and was Distinguished Graduate of my class. Off to Ft Campbell as a Drill Sergeant with C-9-2. The hours were long,

but the end result was quite rewarding. I then applied for Engineer OCS. Of course, Uncle Sam thought I could serve better as an Infantryman---Infantry OCS it was for 26 weeks. After a couple of brief assignments at the Infantry School, I was sent back to Viet Nam as a Platoon Leader with Co B, 1st Bn 12th Inf, 4th Inf Div/. We worked out of the Central Highlands. I got along great with my Platoon Sergeant, Squad Leaders and 1st Sergeant. I would like to believe that my enlisted

background went over well. My Platoon Sergeant was the best. We still attend reunions every now and then. Right now, the past is catching up to me and I travel very little. I went back to Germany from "70 to "73.. My assignments included Company Commander, Bn S3, and Chief, Security Plans and Operations (SPO) for 5th Corps Support Command in Frankfurt. The Bader Meinhof Gang blew up the Frankfurt Officers Club on my watch. My final duty station was Ft Benning.

I held several duty assignments...most importantly, I was the Company Commander of the OCS Company (51st) from which I graduated. A great way to end my military career---9+ years as an Engineer and 10 + years as an Infantryman.

I retired on Jan 31, 1979. I then spent another 20 years with the US Post Office and retired in 1999.

On March 9th, my wife and I celebrated our 48th Anniversary. We actually became pen pals during my first tour in Viet Nam (that's another story). We have one daughter and one grandson.

## CODE OF CONDUCT

*For Members of the Armed Forces of the United States*

**1** I am an American fighting man. I serve in the forces which guard my country and our way of life. I am prepared to give my life in their defense.

**2** I will never surrender of my own free will. If in command I will never surrender my men while they still have the means to resist.

**3** If I am captured I will continue to resist by all means available. I will make every effort to escape and aid others to escape. I will accept neither parole nor special favors from the enemy.

**4** If I become a prisoner of war, I will keep faith with my fellow prisoners. I will give no information or take part in any action which might be harmful to my comrades. If I am senior, I will take command. If not, I will obey the lawful orders of those appointed over me and will back them up in every way.

**5** When questioned, should I become a prisoner of war, I am bound to give only name, rank, service number, and date of birth. I will evade answering further questions to the utmost of my ability. I will make no oral or written statements disloyal to my country and its allies or harmful to their cause.

**6** I will never forget that I am an American fighting man, responsible for my actions, and dedicated to the principles which made my country free. I will trust in my God and in the United States of America.

## GENERAL ORDERS

The general orders for all sentinels are:

- (1) To take charge of this post and all Government property in view.
- (2) To walk my post in a military manner, keeping always on the alert and observing everything that takes place within sight or hearing.
- (3) To report all violations of orders I am instructed to enforce.
- (4) To repeat all calls from posts more distant from the guardhouse than my own.
- (5) To quit my post only when properly relieved.
- (6) To receive, obey, and pass on to the sentinel who relieves me all orders from the commanding officer, officer of the day, and officers and noncommissioned officers of the guard only.
- (7) To talk to no one except in line of duty.
- (8) To give the alarm in case of fire or disorder.
- (9) To call the commander of the guard in any case not covered by instructions.
- (10) To salute all officers and all colors and standards not cased.
- (11) To be especially watchful at night and, during the time for challenging, to challenge all persons on or near my post and to allow no one to pass without proper authority.
