I am sending this article to the newsletter for the interest of the members. The post card photos are of my father and a friend from the Texas Nation Guard 1927. You notice that the issued weapons are the Springfield 1903 bolt action rifles and attached bayonets. My dad was twenty-one at that photo print. My dad passed away in 1977. This article is also in memory of Thomas E. Ellis, born in 1906.

The **M1903 Springfield**, formally the **United States Rifle**, **Caliber .30-06**, **Model 1903**, is an American five-round magazine fed, bolt action service repeating rifle, used primarily during the first half of the 20th century.

It was officially adopted as a United States military bolt-action rifle on June 19, 1903, and saw service in World War I. It was officially replaced as the standard infantry rifle by the faster-firing semi-automatic eight-round M1 Garand starting in 1936. However, the M1903 Springfield remained in service as a standard issue infantry rifle during World War II, since the U.S. entered the war without sufficient M1 rifles to arm all troops. It also remained in service as a sniper rifle during World War II, the Korean War, and even in the early stages of the Vietnam War. It remains popular as a civilian firearm, historical collector's piece, a competitive shooting rifle, and as a military drill rifle.

DOLLARS AND CENTS TO REPLACE YEN

For the first time in post war history, all American Occupation Territories will use the same type occupation currency, the fiscal director of SCAP revealed.

Effective September 30, the new military currency in dollars and cents, resembling American money, will be placed in circulation in japan, Korea, Ryukus, same as was recently announced for Europe.

The New Currency will replace the current A type of yen certificate, used by the occupation troops, with denominations raging from 5, 10, 25, 50 cents to one, five and ten dollars.

Article from the Bayonet Newsletter 7th Infantry Division March 20, 1953

SLEEPLESS ENGINEERS SUPPORT RIFLEMEN AROUND-THE-CLOCK

Sleepless Engineers worked fiercely last week under battle conditions restoring shell-ravaged bunkers on the 7th Division's smoking west central front. As infantrymen fought in the bloody trenches of Old Baldy, crews from Lt. Col. Earl L. Icke's 13th Engineer Combat Battalion moved up a steady flow of prefabricated embattlements.

On Pork Chop, a platoon of grimy men pounded together the heavy, ready-to-beassembled bunkers against intermittent barrages of Chinese mortars and artillery.

Some of the original Pork Chop fortification which survived the Communist overrunning received extensive repairs by the same engineers who pulled off with infantrymen 24 hours previously and later recaptured the hill.

"Our men have been on the go constantly ever since it all started," commented Executive Officer Maj. Fred B. Proctor of San Francisco, in reference to the five Chinese assaults that jarred 7th Division positions Monday night.

"It's gotten to the place where we may have to start working in shifts, just so some of the men can grab a little rest," Proctor himself was red eyed after only three hours sleep in nearly three days.

Engineer truckers hauling pre-fab bunkers, sand bags and barbed wire ground on in an unabating stream and officers feared that lack of rest might result in serious mad accidents. The trucks rolled all the way from corps headquarters to the battle lines. then returned for additional supplies. Every vehicle was busy in the supply movement even bulldozer trailers. At the front, infantrymen were grateful to two engineers who, separated from their outfit, picked up their M-1 rifles and volunteered to join the assault group to re-taking Pork Chop hill. The two were identified as Cpl. Wesley J. Crawford, Jackson, Miss. And Pvt, Joseph B. Corby of Detroit. In the hop-scotch fighting which followed, they were

key men in the setting up of these perimeters. In another instance, an engineer radio operator, unnamed, was reported to have provided the only communications link between his besieged outpost and U.N. frontline troops. The combat engineers, according to Maj. Proctor, had already been working a "double schedule" before the fighting began. At least half of their effort had been the repair of winter-damaged roads.

Unseasonal rains combined with the spring thaw to make what Proctor called "frost boils" large pits which, unless tended to, left roadways a mass of almost untravellable ruts, "We've had a number of casualties" Proctor said, "A lot of the old timers say that we have it rougher now, and that we're working harder, than at any time during the past."

From the Hour Glass Volume IV, No. 297 Wednesday, December 26, 1954

ENGR'S MASTER 3,500 ft. RIDGE

On the ridgeline of a 3,500-foot hill in North Korea, the 13th Engineer Combat Battalion this month bulldozed five miles of climbing, winding road. The job was one of the most unusual missions the battalion has tackled in over a year of warfare in Korea.

Their job was to pioneer a trail, following a rocky, jagged ridgeline, to a point within 2,000 yards of the enemy, where the 17th Infantry "Buffalo" Regiment tanks could blast North Korean bunkers from the top of the mountain.

Strategists decided that the bunkers could be knocked-out almost leisurely if 17th Regiment guns could be positioned where they could fire directly at close range.

To solve the problem, a helicopter flew over the area reconnoitering for a top of the 3,500-foot mountain. Then the engineers were called in.

To build the road the 13th Engineers called on 2nd. Lt. Alfred Olmstead.

A road had already been built to a point on the ridgeline where the trail was to begin. That was 1,500 feet high and in the end of the road five miles away the trail had to wind and climb another 1,700 feet.

"Able" Company had the only bulldozer available for the job. Olmstead and his crew started out on the first day at 4:30 am

The first day was only partly successful. The bulldozer crew leveled off 2,000 yards, one-fifth of the distance, by nightfall, but one of the bulldozer operators was wounded when the tractor hit a mine. Before the day was over the bulldozer had burned out valves.

"Charlie" Company's tractor took over the next morning and worked until the job was done. That day the crew got another 2,000 yards and the task began to look easier.

Progress was nearly at a stand still by the third day when the tractor dug into rock. Then demolition men, led by squad leader Sgt. Richard Triest moved in and went to work.

They hit a literal "brick wall". For the entire day the demolition men blasted the rock but when darkness came, they had progressed only 100 yards.

After that the men began to tire. At 4:30 every morning they were on their way to work and at times it was 11 p.m. that night before they returned. At night guards stayed on the hill with a radio in case of attack. One night they were fired upon, but no attack followed.

Several days the Communists observed the engineers in plain view on the ridge and rained in mortar rounds. Luckily, the Red gunners were not accurate.

By the end of the 9th day, the job was finished. In just nine days the engineers had pioneered five miles of road over nearly impassable terrain.

Attack in the Fog by Bob Larson

Bob Larson was a private first class assigned to the Company E, 7th Cavalry Regiment, U.S. Army

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7th Calvary Trooper stringing barbed wire in Korea – May 6, 1951.

The fog was so thick that I couldn't see the man next to me. We were led down a road to the base of a hill. An officer, unknown to us, explained that the command wanted us to spread out on the road and fix bayonets. When the signal is given, we are to creep up the hill and catch the enemy by surprise with a bayonet attack.

I didn't think too much of the idea and my buddies agreed with me, but we were outvoted. Some of the fellows didn't have bayonets and declared that the orders didn't apply to them, but they too were outvoted.

Up the hill we went, feeling our way along the ground with our feet. Step by step we advanced. It seemed like a ugly dream, but I knew it was all too real. I looked to my right and to my left to find any sign of my buddies. Much to my surprise, I could make out vague forms on each side of me. I could hear whispers all along the line and louder orders to shut up!

While we were standing around arguing, the fog suddenly disappeared, just like somebody waved a magic wand. We were caught out in the open with no cover in sight. The Chinese had been caught by surprise. Both sides just stared at each other in complete bewilderment. A single shot rang out and somebody blew a whistle and shouted "Retreat." We bugged out at full speed down the hill.

I don't speak or understand Chinese, but from behind us I could understand hilarious laughter!

Building a Bunker for the 31st Regiment – 1952 (Carl Fridenstine)

This Story comes from one of our Association members Carl Fridenstine or as they called him while he was in Korea "Friday". Carl served in Charlie Co. 1952 – 1953 so if you remember him please reach out to him, he would love to hear from anyone from the old Squad.

Master Sargent Carl Fridenstine was a member of the 3rd squad of the 3rd platoon of Charlie company. In addition to supervising the construction of this bunker, he was also involved with constructing bridges (Kopyang River, after the battle of Kopyang), prefab structures, culverts, etc. He was sent to basic training at Fort Belvoir, about 20 miles from DC. After basic training Carl attended six weeks of construction training where he was trained on air powered tools (which is all that was available in the US or Korea at that time).

The original photos, some of which are turning yellow, were taken with a simple box camera. They were enhanced with Photoshop Elements 2020.

Our squad was waiting in the truck when our Lt. came out and said, "you are going to build a forward bunker this week and the materials will be there as needed". We drove out to the site and when we arrived, the bulldozer was just finishing the clean-up of the old bunker (which was now off to the side). We had no plans for the new bunker, and no one told us what to do. As a carpenter at home, I always had building plans.

The outline of the old bunker was still visible, so we decided to use that for the layout of the new structure. We had a transit (leveling instrument) and that helped to level the structure, but we could have used some sand to make things even more level. There was a compressor mounted on a truck for the air powered tools.

The bunker foundation was 4 x 12's laid on the dirt. The uprights were precut 12 x 12's. All the lumber was almost knot free. There were also precut 12 x 12's on both ends which were angled between the uprights and pointed to the hill in back. (The truck on the left in Figure 1 has the air compressor.)

The roof support joists were 6 x 12's spaced 3 feet on center. We secured the joists to the 12×12 's by using rebar. 60# nails were used to secure the roof boards and the side boards. Roof boards were 3 x 12's and we used 90 lb. underlayment on top.

With the exterior walls installed, a small bulldozer filled the 2-foot space between the bunker and hill and then spread 2 feet of dirt on top. The bunker held the weight of the bulldozer and dirt with no problem.

The three bunker doors were made of 2 x 12's. They were a challenge to construct as the door openings were not perfectly rectangular, however we made them, and they worked.

Our Lt. never saw the completed bunker as far as I know. As an afterthought, sandbags were added over the dirt in front. This was at a time when President Truman was trying to cut back the cost of the war. We later heard that some folks caught flax over adding the sandbags.
